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President/Vice Chancellor, Prof. Ademola S. Tayo urged the 2,480 graduates to embrace challenges with courage and conviction to create a better world.


"As you step beyond the world of these walls, carry forth the values instilled in you during your time here and let them guide you to make a positive impact on society," he stated.

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"FEAR NOT," BACCALAUREATE SPEAKER INSPIRES GRADS

In an ever restless world often driven by violence, fear and oppression, how can people rise above their fears and live with the firm conviction that God would never leave them?

Pastor Maury Jackson, an Associate Professor of Practical Theology of La Sierra University, USA, addressed this issue as he called on the Zircon Graduating Class to trust God in every situation at the 2023 Babcock Baccalaureate Sabbath service.

His message drawn from the Book of Isaiah 41, called on Class members to understand that fears would never help them achieve their dreams and that a just God hates injustice.

"The Bible says, 'Do not fear for I am with you; do not be afraid for I am your God, I will strengthen you,'" he said.

"When you know that you are unprepared, it brings fear. But when you remove this text from the Judaic context of the Babylonian exile, you realize that it is a generic statement of a God who calls you to trust Him. It offers the assurance of God's presence."

He further submitted that the passage also draws attention to political justice and assurance of divine presence to a people under bondage held by slavery in Babylon.

While the passage brought hope to one group, it also raised fear for those who were the oppres-

sors. The people knew they were paying the price of rebellion and disobedience to God's just laws. They had reason to feel that God was making them pay for the choices they made. Yet, the passage brought assurance.

He reminded them that since Jehovah was not a bias God that played favouritism based on tribal or denominational sentiments, they needed to walk in faith and obedience to God's word while showing justice and mercy to others.

embers of the University's Governing Council and officers of the Zircon graduating Class commissioned eight projects as part of activities marking the 2023 graduation ceremony.

Among these were the: ultramodern Adeoti Tayo in-door Table Tennis Hall commissioned by Nigeria's former permanent representative at the UNESCO and Professor Emeritus Michael Omelewa and the BIG staff residential building, named after its immediate past Group Managing Director, Prof. Yetunde Makinde.

It was commissioned on her behalf by the Human Resources Director, Dr. Adeola Makinde. (see box for details).

The Table Tennis Court, built in conjunction with the Nigeria Table Tennis Federation Championships was a donation of the Grace & Mercy Household Improvement Initiative, an NGO. The project is to immortalize Pa Adeoti Tayo and expected to promote the sports as well as train new champions at both national and international levels.

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BIMUN HOSTS 7TH GENERAL ASSEMBLY

Professor Ademola Stephen Tayo has called on young Africans to be ready to be change agents to bring about impactful leadership for global advancement.

Prof Ademola Tayo, represented by the BU Chief of Staff, Prof David Alao, said the topic of this year's conference, **"A Watershed Moment: Transformative Solu***tions to Interlocking Challenges*" was apt.

"This is a watershed moment to strategize on how to confront the hydra-headed challenges mutating at a terrific speed," he said.

"This is why your gathering here should not be seen as a business but a challenging moment to think out of the box on how you can be a change agent to a decaying system."

In the same vein, the BIMUN Secretary-General, Naa Fofo Djanie from Kenya, urged the youth to use their power of creativity, courage and commitment to fight the ills of conflicts, hunger, poverty, climate disruption and pollution as well as other issues of global threats.

"We urge you to join forces with the United Nations to march against all the catastrophe mitigating against a sustainable, inclusive and peaceful world," she added.

In his presentation, the Geoscience Institute Coordinator of the West Central African Division of the Seventh-day Adventist Church, said the issues of the earth resource management has remained of great concern to the United Nations.

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This, he said, explains the recurring emphasis on recycling to halt mismanagement of the earth's fast depleting resources.

Keynote speaker, Deputy Consul General and Head of Economic team of the Kingdom of the Netherlands in Lagos, Leonie Van Der Stijl, believes the Model United Nations contributes to the development of future leaders in the sense that it enhances their negotiation skills..

"Stepping in the shoes of different countries when you are negotiating with different types of instructions from different types of capitals really brings students all the experiences they need for real negotiations," she said.

Like her, faculty Advisor, Dr Jonathan Dangana is confident that the 2023 BIMUN General Assembly will as usual, proffer solutions to global issues and help build participants' leadership capacity as they hit the ground of diplomacy at an early stage. .

"This will undoubtedly help boost their confidence and get them involved in providing solutions to societal challenges," he said.

Former Ogun State Commissioner for Environment, Mr. Ola Oresanya has called on the Society for Experimental Biology for Nigeria (NISEB) to collaborate with the industry in harnessing biological resources for sustainable development.

Mr Oresanya made the call while delivering a keynote address at the opening of the Babcock-NISEB conference in Ilishan-Remo.

In a paper, Harnessing Experimental Biology for Sustainability from Linear to Circular Economy, Mr. Oresanya said biologists should team up with the industry to move from linear economy to circular economy so that massive resources can be used, reduced and recycled.

He charged experimental biologists to seek partnerships with industry to rework the business model that would enhance natural resources usage.

Speaking, President/Vice Chancellor, Professor Ademola Tayo, represented by the Provost of Benjamin Carson College of Health and Medical Sciences, Professor John Sotunsa said for the nation to grow investment in research must take the front burner.

"NISEB has a big role to play to

for supporting the hosting of the intensive academic discussion in stimulating environment.
