ACADEMIC BUILDING PROJECT UPDATE

Things are looking up for the University's infrastructural development as workmen race to complete several on-going projects on campus.

Among these is the new Academic building situated opposite the Laz Otti Library.

The three-story building project will be equipped with modern laboratories, lecture rooms and offices for faculty and others as approved by the University administration. In an earlier interview, the Associate Vice President for Works & Physical Planning, Prof. Ezekiel Adeniran said Sheo Nigeria Ltd is handling the contract and are working to ensure completion.

"For now, we are not tagging the project with a particular School though the School of Nursing is going to get a part of the space," he added.

Already, painting and plumb-

ing works are on-going. External work including clean up and landscaping are expected to commence.

One of the site Engineers, Mr. Kingsley Olubanjo is optimistic that barring any delays, the project will be ready for delivery and commissioning soon.

ork is in progress in the permanent sites of the two newly approved schools: School of Environmental Sciences and School of Engineering.

According to the Associate Vice President for Works & Physical Planning, Prof. Ezekiel Adeniran, work in the School of Engineering is 65% completed while in the school of Environmental Sciences is about 35% completed.

Both projects are on-going in Iperu, close to the School of Law & Security Studies.

Together, the Schools will run Bachelors degrees in: Architecture, Estate Management, Electrical & Electronics Engineering, Mechanical Engineering,, Civil Engineering, and Computer Engineering.

"These approvals will help us

contribute our quota to the development of Engineering in the country," said the Senior Vice President Academics, Prof. Philemon Amanze.

Meanwhile, workmen at the two new hostels on the main campus are racing to complete the projects.

At the male hostel, project contractor and CEO of Fagorite Nigeria Ltd, Mr. Kolawole Sherafat, is confident that work will be delivered ahead of freshmen resumption, October 30.

"Clean up and final paint work have commenced," he said. "We await the contractor to power the building."

Aside the common reading areas and reception, the 243room facility has walk-in closet and reading areas ensuite. It is expected to accommodate six per room. The female hostel project contractor, CEO of Movers Nig. Ltd Engineer Olusola Olaniran said he awaits materials for completion in key areas including decking of Block C.

So far, tiling work and screeding have begun in Block A while in Block B, screeding, fixing of aluminium window frames and burglary proof are in progress.

"We can draw up a delivery date as soon as all the materials are available," he said.

o contribute to national development and qualify for global relevance, postgraduate teachers must be innovative and entrepreneurial.

Senior Vice President Academics, Professor Philemon Amanze made this submission while declaring open the one-day workshop for teachers, supervisors and mentors hosted by the College of Postgraduate Studies (CGPS).

He said the programme themed, "Postgraduate Teaching and Supervision for National Development and Global Relevance" would not only enhance core areas of discipline, but boost innovative and entrepreneurial skills.

It is also expected to hone research skills for national development.

"Teachers must take new skills and also learn how to mix machines with man-made efforts," said Prof. Amanze. He further stressed the need to embrace the use of Artificial Intelligence which was fast gaining global recognition.

Aside honing skills, the Acting College Provost, Dr Olutayo Shokunbi, said the workshop is expected to help participants come better prepared for the new academic session. "It is good to address all our issues before we focus on national issues and global relevance," he stated.

BUCODEL GETS MORE NUC-APPROVED PROGRAMMES

The Babcock Centre for Open Distance and e-Learning (BUCODeL) has received the NUC-approval for more programmes. In this interview, Director of the Centre, Professor Mobolanle Ebunoluwa Sotunsa talks about BUCODeL's uniqueness. admission requirements and available courses among others. Excerpts:

Q: Please what is the Centre for Open Distance and e-Learning all about?

A: The Open, Distant and e-Learning has been configured to be delivered to learners wherever they are in the world. From the comfort of their homes, to the busy offices, market places and anywhere they are able to learn from.

Q: What is unique about that of Babcock?

A: It is in the strength of our capacity and programmes. It is among few running three, Prof. Mobolanle Sotunsa National Universities Com-

mission-approved programmes within the first two years of take-off: B.Sc Accounting, B.Sc Computer Science and MBA.

O: How many courses were approved for the Centre for Open Distant and e-Learning at take-off?

A: We had only B. Sc. Accounting when we started. Recently, the NUC approved B.Sc. Computer Sciences and Masters in Business Administration (MBA). We are hoping to have more courses before the year runs out.

Q: What level are the pioneer students at Babcock Open Distant and e-Learning?

A: Our pioneer students started in 2021 with B.Sc. Accounting and are already in their 300 level.

Q: Some people have said that there are some courses like Medicine and Surgery cannot be taught online in virtual setting. Is there a time when this could actually be done in a virtual setting?

A: Yes, absolutely! There are virtual reality labs and stimulation labs where lessons are carried out and students learn or see how operations are carried out.

For example, our Computer Science programme has pluggedin virtual labs where our students can do their practical without physically attendance in Babcock.

Q: Are the fees the same with the residential learning?

A: No, it isn't. Distant learning is quite cheaper than the residential. But it is for the learner not the university as some overhead costs borne by residential students are not paid for by the distant learner. A session's fee for B.Sc. Accounting and Computer Science students at BUCODel, is N255, 000 Naira only as opposed to the N2.34 million and N2.13million per session respectively.

Q: What are the admission requirements for the courses?

A: The basic standard is five credits including Mathematics and English. For Accounting, prospective students, credits in Economics or Commerce are required as well.

Distant learners don't need a JAMB score for admission but need to register with the Joint Admission and Matriculation Board. It is the only body statutorily empowered to offer admission into tertiary institutions nationwide. For the MBA, it is a first degree from any field.

Q: What is the duration of programme?

A: For the B.Sc Accounting and Computer Science it is the normal four years as in the residential learning. The difference is the flexibility of time of learning. It is called priority of esteem.

Q: Is there any opportunity for the students to know their classmates?

A: Definitely, there is opportunity to meet your classmates through live classes and the revision period before exams where we encourage everyone to be physically present for better-student interaction.
