### BABCOCK UPHOLDS COMMITMENT TO WOMEN ADVANCEMENT AT TVC

dvocacy for women education and their role in national development were on the top burner as the University administration made a strong case for women empowerment.

This was during a courtesy visit of the President/Vice Chancellor, Professor Ademola Tayo and a team of officers to the Lagos studio of the Television Continental, TVC.

While Prof. Tayo expressed his administration's empathy over the hoodlums' attack on TVC during the End SARS protest last year, the visit also opened preliminary discussions on possible partnerships especially in capacity building of female staff of the network and brand visibility,.

"I am a firm believer of the emancipation of women," said Prof. Tayo. "I believe society would be better off if more women get education because they hold the keys to everything. That is why your proposal sits well with me."

The TVC Chief Operating Officer, Mr. Andrew Hanlon, shared the network's passion for staff capacity building as well as providing logistic support for the TVC Women Network according to global best practice.

"We provide counselling and encourage the women to take active role or aspire to senior managerial positions," he said. "Television Continental is the only television station that has received the award of Great Place to work in Africa."

He said the TVC Women Network recently funded and organized a national girl-child debate to encourage learning among female students as well as boost their confidence in speaking out on national issues.

According to him, the proposed partnership with the University would create more opportunity for the advancement of women.

The School of Nursing Sciences has formally hosted its chapter of the Sigma Theta Tau International Honour Society of Nursing.

### PROF ONUOHA EXPLORES SURGERY WITHOUT KNIVES

urgery without knives has opened a new way to handle old challenges in Medicine: fear of knives. Professor of General and Paediatric Surgery, Prof. Clement Onuoha revealed this while delivering the University's 34th inaugural lecture December 4, 2021.

In his lecture, *Surgery without Knives*, he listed how the use of minimally invasive surgery has turned the Babcock University Teaching Hospital into a medical tourist destination in the country.

This surgery without knives involves the use of laparoscopes, and various types of endoscopes to diagnose and treat different types of diseases such as gastrojejunostomy with Roux-en-Y anastomosis for people with complicated ulcer.

In general surgery, a Roux-en-Y anastomosis, is an end-to-side surgical procedure used to reconstruct the gastrointestinal tract.

He said this method also produces permanent intentional weight loss without diet restrictions and use of drugs.

This supersedes previous procedures like wiring of the teeth, liposuction as well as dietary adjustments which are difficult to maintain with problem of recurrent or rebound obesity.

Prof. Onuoha affirms there is certainly a future in surgery

without knives.

He said since it became functional at BUTH, over 50 surgeries involving acute appendicitis, ear, nose and throat (ENT) as well as removal of Hernia and gall stones have been performed using this procedure.

Other surgeries that have been carried out without knives are fibroids, ovarian tumours, family (tubal litigation) and over 1000 diagnostic and therapeutic procedures.

He advised people above 40 years to go for screening endoscopy using this procedure to check for intestinal growth. With this procedure, he said the patient may not need another test for the next 10 years.

Professor Onuoha, however, said if a growth is detected during the endoscopic screening, it could be treated early before it became too late.

With these possibilities, surgery without knives has come to stay.

### PRESIDENT HOSTS PRESS LUNCHEON

President/Vice Chancellor, Prof. Ademola S. Tayo has called for a better deal for journalists in the country.

His submission which came up at the annual Babcock University Presidential luncheon for Education Correspondents and their families, is that nations would produce better informed populations with better equipped and paid press.

Prof. Tayo also reiterated the need for a national insurance scheme for media men who risk lives and limbs in the discharge of their duties.

"I'm often amazed how you risk your lives while reporting from the front-lines of crisis-ridden areas to disseminate information" he said.

He also cited inadequate security and transportation to get to breaking news events as other challenges faced by the media.

"Whether we admit it or not, any country which is not properly in-

formed, would end up deformed," he added.

Beyond these, the event also created an interactive platform for addressing other issues of local, na-



tional and global concerns. Top among these was the introduction of University's bio-gas project and Nelson Uwakwe, the 17-year old 200 level student of Software Engineering.




