The Babcock University project is a "story of impossibility made possible," said immediate past President/ Vice Chancellor, Prof J. A. Kayode Makinde.

His remarks came amidst calls for continuous prayers for the sustenance of the BU project while delivering the 60/20 anniversary lecture of the institution.

Prof. Makinde's lecture, *From Egypt to Canaan,* marked a key point of a weeklong celebration

tagged **"Journey of** Grace."

According to him, when Babcock's doors opened for admission on September 13, 1999, only a memorial church building, an old classroom block, two halls of residence, Welch and White halls, administrative block, bursary and seven dusty roads existed.

Today, he said the narrative has changed, giving credence to the fact that when God is involved in any assignment, He backs it up with providence.

He paid tribute to former Registrar, late Dr. Shem Magaji, Bursar, Prof. Luke Onuoha and his predecessor, Prof. Adekunle Alalade for the vital roles played in the university's take off.

Prof. Makinde also thanked the present University administration for consolidating on past achievements.

BABCOCK MARKS FOUNDERS DAY IN STYLE

Babcock University Founder's Day is a fulfillment of a dream. President/Vice Chancellor, Professor Ademola Tayo declared as he presented the 60/20 anniversary address with news of the 2019 World Branding Award (Education category), tipped in favour of Babcock for the fifth time.

Prof Tayo who paid tribute to the founding fathers, said the dream to establish a model institution to train servant leaders has not only been fulfilled through producing more humane, industry-relevant leaders, but through producing record-breakers.

"After a humble beginning with few courses in pastoral ministry, Business Administration, and pre-Nursing programme," he said, "Babcock now has 38 courses, nine schools with specialized departments, and three colleges including that of Postgraduate Studies,

He noted that the institution which began 60 years ago with seven stu-

dents as an affiliate to Andrews University, USA, now has a diversified student population of over 10, 000 and more than 29,000 alumni globally. The postgraduate programme has witnessed a similar increase in public acceptance bringing its student population from 300 in 2010, to over 1,000 in 2019.

It has also remained the first in the country to produce 18 PhDs in Accounting within one session.

Professor Tayo said the University is poised to boost the formal education sector with the introduction of e-learning and Environmental Sciences programme.

He thanked all stakeholders and friends of the University for supporting the institution through her 'journey of grace'.

In recognition of this, the administration presented special plaques to both corporate and individual sponsors. Amongst these were: Pacific Holdings, WEMA Bank Plc, United Bank for Africa, UBA, New Horizon and Zenith among others.

ver 2,000 persons gathered at the amphitheatre recently to celebrate more than just another thanksgiving Sabbath.





"MUSHROOM INDUSTRY CAN CREATE 50,000 JOBS"

The National President of Mushroom Growers Processors and Marketers Association of Nigeria, MGPMA, Chief Michael Awunor said that the mushroom sector is capable of generating 50, 000 jobs annually.

His revelation came at the opening of a two-day sensitization programme of Mushroom Growers' Southwest States of Nigeria held in Babcock.

Aside job opportunities, the National President said mushroom is more nutritious than meat, useful in pharmaceuticals for drug production as well as requiring low capital for take off. He stated that Babcock University was the first training centre in Nigeria because of its faith-based, holistic learning environment.

Affirming similar views, the President/Vice Chancellor Professor Ademola Tayo said because of its high nutritional value, mushroom has been included in student diet.
