The event was in collaboration with the Ogun State Cycling Club. In his opening remarks, the Director of Student Activities, Dr. Wole Oyerinde, said beyond leisure, the campaign was also to encourage the University community to take their exercises more seriously.

Among the more than 40 cyclists, was 10-year old who took off from the sports complex at the main campus. The ride covered the

stretch from Ilishan-Remo through the Lagos Benin expressway and the Iperu mini campus to Irolu and back.

Club Chair/Director of Physical Planning, Architect Mykell Jegede said the exercise was not new to the child who had participated in an 80-km road show.

"Our goal is to expand membership, encourage people to bike and promote health."

In addition, he said the long term plan is to create points on campus from where people can pick up bicycles and drop off at designated points.

As a result, the club is looking at a proposal from team members of a bicycle manufacturing firm to study its feasibility.

For faculty member, Dr. Margaret Anaeto, the cycling experience was "exciting."

She added that the awareness was also aimed at building support towards the 2020 edition of the *Tour de Babcock* marathon cycling programme.

head of the 2020 internship programme, the University's Unit for Student Industrial Work Experience Scheme (SIWES) hosted a one-day student orientation last week.

Held in collaboration with the Abeokuta Area office of the Industrial Training Fund (ITF), the programme presented a platform for information sharing and interaction amongst participants.

According to the ITF Area Manager Mrs. Funmi Coker, apart from enabling students acquire industrial skills, the scheme was to provide hands on experience to bridge the gap between theory and practice.

Mrs. Coker who was accompanied by a SIWES officer, Mr. Ibrahim Yusuf, said the programme is a six units compulsory course that any student who misses must repeat it.

She said it was not enough to have theoretical training but additional practical training that would provide knowledge in real work situation.

She also urged prospective interns to ensure active internship with functional companies not simply because of the obvious grade advantage, but to add value to their career development.

She further stressed on the need for proper documentation and compliance to organizational regulations to avoid undue stress.

Before their departure, the ITF team paid the President/Vice Chancellor, Professor Ademola Tayo a courtesy visit.

Professor Tayo noted that ITF was an important stakeholder in the institution's quest to deliver academic excellence.

Mrs. Coker thanked the Vice Chancellor for the continuous cooperation of Babcock University and support in all ITF activities.

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VC SAYS STAFF WELFARE IS KEY

The welfare of staff and faculty remain a top burner issue for this administration, says President/Vice Chancellor, Prof. Ademola S. Tayo while addressing the congregation recently.

To buttress this point, he promised an upward review of salaries as soon as outstanding loans were liquated.

He said while the University had fully liquidated some of its loans, it remained committed to meeting all its financial obligations for the others.

He thanked the congregation for their "stout support" during the University's 60/20 anniversary celebration and called for more cooperation on all fronts with the administration. He also asked all to refrain from actions that would jeopardize the university's progress.

On academics, he said besides the outstanding performance of 10 Babcock alumni who made first class in

the 2019 Bar Exams at the Nigerian Law School, the School of Nursing Sciences also recorded a brilliant performance with a one making a 98.6 % success in the professional examination.
