The University has a new Director to head the Department of Academic Planning: Professor Oludele Awodele and Dr. Obinna Okoro as his Deputy Director. Their respective appointments took effect from June 1

Prof. Awodele who takes over from Professor Philemon Amanze, now Senior Vice President Academics, comes with a wealth of experience having previously served as Head of Computer Science Department and Dean of the School of Computing & Engineering Sciences,

Similarly, Dr. Obinna takes over from Dr. Clara Egwuonwu who moves her experience to the Department of Education as a faculty member.

Professor Amanze encouraged the new Director to rise to the challenges with courage and follow up on pending matters as the Director of Academic Planning is the bridge between the University and the National Universities Commission.

n keeping with global best practice, safety and professionalism, the University's Transport Unit in collaboration with the Innovative Logistics & Transport Systems, Lagos, held a two-day training programme for drivers.

The programme themed, **Safety & Security for Professional Drivers,** featured facilitators from the Red Cross, the Lagos State Police Command, Federal Road Safety Corps Fire Service and other related stakeholders.

While declaring the programme open, President/Vice Chancellor, Prof. Ademola S. Tayo, asked partici-

pants to take full advantage of the training and be ready to apply the knowledge on the highway.

"What we did was to package a robust programme for drivers," said programme organizer and MD of Innovative Logistics & Transport Systems, Mr. Dayo Bello, "This would help them save lives, understand security driving, fire prevention, safety and apply emotional intelligence while using the highway.

"We have looked at the challenges faced by drivers on Nigerian roads and offered training to help reduce crashes."
