PRESIDENT SETS FIVE-YEAR ROADMAP



#### Prof. Ademola Tayo

The President/Vice Chancellor, Prof. Ademola S. Tayo and other officers last week presented a comprehensive five-year roadmap as the University held its first virtual colloquium for staff and faculty, January 7 – 9, 2021.

While spirituality and staff

welfare remained top agenda issues, the roadmap also touched on academic expansion and infrastructural development.

These include the establishment of the School of Earth & Environmental Sciences and a department of Entrepreneurship among others.

The event also provided a rallying point to reflect on the theme: *Education in the End Time: Upholding the Vision Beyond* 60/20.

From Academics to Student Development, the charge called for a spiritual renewal and commitment to institutional core values.

"I want to welcome you to a year of unprecedented breakthrough," said Prof. Tayo. "Amidst the gloomy atmosphere, God will continue to prosper Babcock."

His call also focused on integrity, due diligence and commitment to duty.

"I charge you to be a good role model especially since our lives may be the only Bible some of our students may ever read," he remarked.

ow do we sustain wholesome living in a fast-paced, morally decadent world? Or how can we make our role more impactful in this situation?

These questions touched the core of Dr Comfort Oyinloye's

devotional delivered at the colloquium. Titled, End-Time Dynamics: Sustaining Wholesome Living in a Fast-paced World. the message underlined the importance of wisdom and reverence for God as well as a paradigm shift interpersonal relain tions.

DR. OYINLOYE CALLS FOR PARADIGM SHIFT

Her recommendation also emphasized applying the golden rule; being a carrier of good news; speaking up against injustice and judging fairly. "Don't apply different rules to different people," she said.

Dr. Oyinloye who teaches in the Department of Education, called for better preparedness for classes and willingness to build the students up for good.

"The greatest want in the world is the want of men, men whose conscience is as true to duty as the compass is to the pole," she said.

# **ERGONOMICS AND END-TIME DYNAMICS**



The Head of the University's Teaching Hospital Orthopaedic Department, Dr. Kelechukwu Onuoha reiterated the need for balance and good posture in the work place among others for optimum health.

His presentation, *Ergonomics & End-Time Dynamics,* listed risk factors of work-induced spinal pain and stress resulting in poor health, absentee-ism, loss of manpower hours and in extreme cas-

es, death.

He noted that these and other high risk factors repetition, poor

light, static position, compression and contact stress as well as quick motions - were both preventable and within our control.

For example, he said a staff whose job is sedentary, can occasionally move around to avoid sitting for too long.

Similarly, pain prevention may simply require change of office chair, observing the rules of balance, trying out new ways to do the same thing and recognizing the best ways to handle the three types of ergonomics – physical, cognitive and environmental.

# DR. KIBUUKA ON GLOBAL MISSION

dventist Education will be unable to achieve its heavenappointed task of redemption and restoration unless adequate preparations are in place to handle critical decision-making in teaching, training and total membership involvement.

Lead speaker for the 2021 colloquium, Dr Hudson Kibuuka made this submission as he presented his paper, *I will Go: General Conference Strategic Plan 2020 - 2025.* 

The five-year global plan takes into cognisance the complexity of today's society which calls for reengi-

"We ought to teach higher order thinking skills which are: creativity, Information processing, Interpretation and modelling," said Dr. Kibuuka who is the Associate Director of Education at the Maryland headquarters of the General Conference of Seventh-day Adventist Church, USA.

He added that these strategies will provide the requisite knowledge to dealing with real life situations.

"Today, people are not necessarily considered knowledgeable based on

how much information they have," he said, "But by how much facility they have with that information; how much they can decipher from it for good."

He also called for total membership involvement, (TMI) in imbibing the values and principles of mission which begins with each one of us.

Consequently, his paper advocates the adoption of the *I Will Go* mission principle in training both within and outside the classroom across Adventist institutions globally.

Originally from Brazil, this principle which combines training and mission, has become a global outreach strategy of the Education Department of the General Conference of Seventhday Adventist Church worldwide.

# **OFFICERS REPORT**

Principal officers led by the President/Vice Chancellor, Prof. Ademola S. Tayo, set the direction for the new administrative roadmap with a call to diligence, determination and deeper commitment with God.

"I welcome you to a year of unprecedented breakthrough," he said. "God says ' I will watch over you and instruct you which way to go.'"

Below is a summary of the roadmap from the divisional heads:

PRESIDENCY: The President capped the different strategic development goals with the plan to construct the University senate building and the new Accident & Emergency Centre complete with an MRI.

In addition, Prof. Tayo revealed that his administration's drive towards achieving all round access to internet connectivity on campus to facilitate learning, research and innovation.

ACADEMICS: Senior Vice President Academics, Prof. Philemon Amanze's roadmap pointed to the new programmes and the expansion of existing ones.

All 38 undergraduate programmes from Accounting to Nursing are fully accredited.

Similarly, Babcock will begin running selected programmes through Distance & E-Learning as soon as it receives the National Universities Commission Accreditation team's nod of approval.

MANAGEMENT SERVICES: The SVP for this Division, Prof. Yacob Haliso summed his direction for the years ahead with a plan to develop a more robust relationship with the University's alumni and leverage on the existing relationship for growth.

He will continue working through the Marketing department to ensure BU remains the preferred brand for national and international students' enrolment. The campus radio, Hope 89.1 FM and Adventist World radio will continue to broadcast Christian and educational programmes for missionary and public service.

FINANCIAL MANAGEMENT: The Vice President Financial Administration, Dr. Folorunsho Akande, commits to a fiscal plan that will go beyond managing assets and resources to providing support for infrastructural development

### STUDENT DEVELOPMENT

This Division comprises hostels, Student Support Centre, and Sports. The new Vice President Student Development, Pastor (Dr) Sunday Audu promises to encourage a more studentfriendly environment to enhance development.

This involves the active collaboration of all unit and departmental heads to improve the home away from home experience.

# PROF. AMANZE PROMOTES ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

enior Vice President, Academics, Professor Philemon Amanze gave a 10-point recommendation for promoting academic excellence during his presentation at the colloquium.

Top among these were: identifying our priorities by putting God first, global best practice in teaching, learning and assessment as well as student support.

In his paper, End-time dynamics: achieving academic excellence without compromise, Professor Amanze said Babcock University would continue to support collaborations to promote capacity building, interdisciplinary research and community engagement.

He said while these remain top

priorities, the University would uphold its God-first approach in its dealings, maintain accountability and create an enabling environment to foster holistic development.

This, he said, explains why the University administration encourages students to take advantage of internship opportunities to improve learning, workstudy programmes, exposure to international learning and experience and other measures to facilitate short and long term success.

"Excellence comes with a price tag, and only those who understand its worth can pay for it," he stated.

# ENTREPRENUERSHIP IS THE WAY TO GO



B abcock University can only be more successful in entrepreneurial development by thinking outside the box.

The Dean of the School of Management Sciences, Professor Johnson Egwakhe made this submission at the 2021 virtual colloquium while making a strong case for entrepreneurship.


For him, this implies looking for new ideas, solutions and opportunities in the market as well as a passion for uniqueness in service delivery.

Among other strategies, his paper, *Personal Initiative Programme*, listed resilience in identifying problems, needs and opportunities as the basic tools for socio-economic expansion in the face of uncertainties.

"If Babcock is to succeed, it must be innovative and deliberate," he said.

Professor Egwakhe said beyond the process of opportunity and needs identification, there is also the need to step ahead of competitors in the way we do business.

Babcock University has annulled the re-submission of articles for consideration for promotion by faculty beginning from this year 2021.

Former Senior Vice President, Academ-

ics. Professor Iheanyichukwu Okoro and faculty member in Computer Science Department. Dr. Seun Ebiesuwa made this known while making presentation at the colloquium.

In the paper,

**Presentation on Promotion for BU Academic Staff**, it stated that effective from this year, any candidate turned down at the Academic Standards Board will have to apply next year as resubmissions will no longer be allowed.

Similarly, all the papers earlier submitted for promotion with Turn-it-in reports should not be resent to the Turn-it-in software. Candidates should rather make use of the previous Turnit-in reports they had for such papers.

"Any candidate who presents a Turn-it-in report of 0%, would be considered to have committed an academic fraud as that suggests a manipulation of the software."

# SCHOOLS WITHOUT WALLS

nder the new normal, Professor Chibueze Ogbonna says projectized systems thinking would help organizations achieve more than those that work in isolation.

He explained that with projectized systems thinking, an organization or entity with interrelated and inter- Prof. Chibueze Ogbonna dependent parts is able to

work together to achieve a common purpose than working in isolation.

In his paper, End-time dynamics: building virile systems thinking in a school without a wall, Professor Ogbonna identified the power of collaboration in organizational development.

He said just as the iceberg has different levels and only the tip is seen at the top, so do organizations also have different structures and units that are interrelated and interconnected with just a handful seen by the external public.

He therefore called for a harmonization of individual strengths and values to enable the organ-



ization achieve desired results.

According to him, public acceptance of a product or service comes with expectations which need to be met and sustained.

Consequently, he stressed the need to leverage on its IT connectivity as well as collaborative skills as premium for brand acceptance, especially in the digital world.

Realizing that most often when organizations get to their peaks there is tendency to become laid back, Prof. Ogbonna called for an evaluation and processing of the iceberg organizational model.

Professor Ademola Tayo said the university is eager to see the immediate take-off of the Babcock University Distance & E-Learning Centre.

He stated this while welcoming a three-man team from National Universities Commission (NUC) on advisory visit to the centre.

He said the university has done a lot to get the centre ready for its immediate take off.

He therefore urged the team to take a thorough look at everything that had been done, saying that administration is ready to put to use whatever advice the team might give, to accelerate its approval and eventual take-off.

Team leader and NUC Director ODeL, Engineer Kayode Odedina said their visitation was to assess how far the University had gone in getting the centre ready for take-off. "We are here to match what have seen on paper with what is on ground," he said. "It is to see how robust the ICT is, the guidelines and the dedicated building for the centre, among others."

From the teams' exit report the University has fulfilled a 90% compliance to NUC's guidelines for setting up a distance learning centre.

Engineer Kayode Odedina who made this known said "Babcock has only just a few things left."



According to Dr. Onuoha, the patient was awake during surgery because she had a combined epidural and spinal anaesthesia and suffered minimal blood loss.

"Thanks to the efficiency of our Consultant Anaesthetist, Dr. Salami and other medical team, the patient has already been discharged and undergoing rehabilitation with the Physiotherapist," he said. "My gratitude also goes to the BUTH administration for providing the state of the art equipment to work with."

The department has successfully carried out other surgeries including hip and knee replacement, club foot correction, spinal surgeries and other complex fracture fixations.
