ADMINISTRATION HOSTS VIRTUAL PCF

ver 940 participants joined online as the University's President/Vice Chancellor, Prof Ademola S. Tavo reaffirmed his commitment to student welfare at the virtual Parents Consultative Forum held January 26. Beyond information sharing on major milestones of the University and her alumni, the virtual meeting provided an interactive platform for addressing mutual concerns.

Top among these were: fees, online classes and exams as well as student welfare. Prof. Tayo said whilst he understood parental challenges in securing funds in a recessive economy, the University administration ensured sessional fees remained unchanged with only

marginal review on feeding costs.

He said this was in spite of inflationary trend and the 50% reduction in the number of students per room in halls of residence in the peak of the lockdown.

Consequently, a room previously meant for six students now accommo-

dated three while a room that previously meant for four, now takes two.

He thanked all the parents, staff and faculty whose contribution he said helped in no small measure in putting the University on a higher pedestal.

HIGHLIGHTS OF THE PCF MEETING

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ON FOOD

The University's policy on lactovegetarian meals provide healthy, nutrition and holistic development. Besides, the food council also has student representatives on board who ensure quality control and taste.

ON HOSTEL SANITATION

Babcock University spends millions of Naira on fumigation to maintain sanitation and eliminate bedbugs in halls of residence annually during summer holidays. Prof. Tayo called for parental support in conducting luggage checks before leaving home to avoid unwittingly bringing in bugs.

ON PARENTAL ACCESS TO RESULTS

Parents have a right to access results of their wards and those unable to do so with the username and passwords, could meet with Registry staff for assistance.

ON INDUCTION OF MEDICAL &

NURSING GRADUATES

The induction of both Nursing and Medical graduates who have successfully completed their professional exams December 2020, would hold as soon as the regulatory bodies, the Medical and Dental Council of Nigeria as well as Nursing and Midwifery Council of Nigeria were ready.

ON ETRANZACT PAYMENT PLAT-FORM

Vice President Financial Administration, Dr Folorunsho Akande, said

the Etranzact payment platform is secured and offers a seamless process for student registration from the comfort of their homes, selecting halls of residence, meal options and courses among others. Even so, he said Babcock is test running an alternative payment platform which can interface the internet with the Etranzact payment platform.

ON SECURITY

"God is our security But security is everybody's concern," said the Director of Babcock Security, Dr. Chukwumah Ajike. " We encourage our children to be aware and be mindful of their associates so no one exploits their vulnerability."

ON PSYCHOSOCIAL SUPPORT

Dr. Elizabeth Oknowko, the Director of Student Support Centre, spoke on drug use, prevention and recognition of the early signs of abuse to avoid brain damage.

ON MUTUAL COLLABORATION The PCF Vice Chair, Pastor Ola Oyinloye explained that Babcock University was doing a lot to ensure student security and safety.

"Let's talk to our children and let them know about the situation at hand so they do their part to remain safe," he said. "Thank God they can continue their education in Babcock."

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2020 CPE TRAINEES SHARE VISION

In campuses, prisons, military camps and hospitals worldwide, Seventh-day Adventists Chaplains identify vulnerable persons and circumstances and offer words of encouragement and prayers as part of the healing process. This often brings about positive changes for both the care-giver and receiver. Last December. the BU Centre for Clinical Pastoral Education began its professional programme with nine pioneer trainees. Excerpts of their vision and views about the programme:

Pastor MAIGADI, Ibrahim

Clinical Pastoral Education opens great opportunities to serve God and humanity. New relationships with patients, clinical staff and fellow CPE students are created and developed. The programme opens new challenges of coping with patients' health issues as well as clinical staff multi-dimensional medical approaches that call for experience and new methods of solving them.

There were too many academic materials and online references to cope with. Yet a CPE trainee is expected to visit the hospital with little time to study on the job and existing pastoral services.

The enabling power from God, and support from my Northern Nigeria Union Conference and family helped me to cope. I dealt with the challenges by reprioritizing departmental

programs and action on existing plans.

IDOWU, Mary: Before the CPE program, I struggled with fear and anxiety; fears on whether I was fit for the program and could cope with rigours of study under the prevailing situation.

I discovered that working with peers and letting myself become vulnerable to correction, counsel and direction from my supervisor were a great advantage for personal development. This enhanced my ability to empathize with those in critical conditions and creating a channel of hope to the hopeless.

Initially, I didn't like the aspect of self revelation of the past, but found out that true healing of old wounds could only begin with it. Healing has to start with one's self before it can be extended to others. Aside this, I realized finding my sense of humor in this trying period was another healthy way to build resilience.

Another was self-identification. I have to identify who I am before I can identify with others.

SALAMI, Ayodele: Coming for this programme at a critical time like this when going to hospital is highly challenging has not been easy.

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Writing of weekly clinical reflection is another big task but the Lord has been my strength.

The CPE training is about selfdiscovery so I can care for others. I do daily self-reflection which helps me to set boundaries in my dealings. It has also helped me in the course of my work and during my weekly clinical 48 hours at Babcock Teaching Hospital.

With the reality of Covid-19, I have to use the personal protective equipment (PPE) as I work in the hospital environment and know that I should not take the Covid-19 for granted.

Pastor Salami is based in Lagos where he works as Chaplain for the Lagos mainland Conference of the Seventh-day Adventist Church.

NWOSI, Uzoma: The CPE experience is a training that I have been praying to have, because it has a prospect of increasing the social capital and the capacity building of the Adventist Church in Nigeria and beyond.

With it I believe the remaining portions of chaplaincy ministry years would be more impactful than the former years, because CPE holds the prospect of a bright future for all!

This training made a lot of positive impact on my relationship with people and revealed things that I didn't know about myself.

Reading and applying the knowledge in the books and other materials the educator exposed us to, helped me to cope.

Pastor (Dr.) ENANG, John: The CPE training created a paradigm shift in my understanding and practice of ministry. It enhanced my understanding of self-awareness and self-care for more effective ministry.

Traveling in and out of Babcock was challenging especially the time of the year the training was scheduled. Another concern was safety. But I appreciate the CPE staff who held an orientation to take care of

Initially, I wondered how I could work with patients with the social distancing protocol in place. But during the time spent at BUTH, I discovered that it was still possible to work and meet with people, impacting their lives positively without breaching the Covid-19 safety protocol.

Pastor Enang is the Healthcare Chaplain Director and Adventist Chaplaincy Ministries at the West Central Africa Division of the Seventh-day Adventist Church in Abidjan, Cote d'Ivoire.

Pastor (Dr) AHIAMADU, Ugochukwu: Learning something new is always a challenge. But, learning and knowing it is a mark of progress in life. Beyond this, our educators were fairly downto-earth and the collegial atmosphere of our class sessions enhanced my ability to cope.

There were challenges like getting adjusted to school life again, but the benefits of the training far outweigh its challenges. That reality is encouraging enough to make me fulfill the purpose of the training.

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FRESHMEN SPEAK ON THE ON-SITE RESUMPTION

Health and safety were on the top burner as the University took active steps to ensure safety against community spread of Covid-19 with freshmen on-site resumption.

The resumption which came up in batches according to Schools, marked the beginning of the 2020/2021 academic session for the new students and second semester for returning 300 level students.

Top on the safety agenda were the mandatory Covid-19 tests and use of masks and hand sanitizers while on campus. "We cannot afford to take any chances on community spread

of the virus so we are taking all necessary precautions," said President/Vice Chancellor, Prof. Ademola S. Tayo.

The health team from the Babcock University Teaching Hospital led by the Deputy Director of Clinical Ser-
