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BU LAW PROFESSOR CLINCHES LNGL 2021 LITERARY PRIZE

igerian-Canadian Author and Babcock University Professor of Law, Cheluchi Onyemelukwe-Onuobia has clinched the 2021 Nigerian prize for literature for her book, **Son of the House.**

The prize, offered by the Nigeria Liquefied Natural Gas Limited comes with a \$100,000 dollar award.

Besides the financial reward, it has also placed Prof. Onyemelukwe-Onuobia whose focus in Law borders on health, gender,

and violence against women and children, in the league of Nigeria's literary giants.

Managing Director/CEO, of the LNGL Dr. Philip Mshelbila, disclosed the organization has spent millions of dollars to grow the country's creative sector,

"For us to create a better

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society, we need the imaginative power of the fiction writer to dream up the impossible. We also need scientists using the scientific method to find the best and most efficient way to make that dream a reality," he said.

"That is why in NLNG, we have, since 2004, spent tens of millions of dollars to ensure that these groups of special

minds never give up on their efforts and never give in to the emptiness that their solitary journey into the search for the unknown, sometimes, presents them with."

Prof. Onyemelukwe-Onuobia said in an earlier interview that she was still numb with surprise as the work was turned down by several publishers before its acceptance and final publication.
