BUTH CARRIES OUT BILATERAL TOTAL KNEE REPLACEMENT

s the University intensifies efforts to change the narrative of medical tourism outside Nigeria, Babcock University Teaching Hospital has once again recorded another first: a successful bilateral total knee replacement surgery.

According to the medical team lead and Head of the Orthopaedics Department, Dr. Kelechukwu Onuoha, the procedure was carried out on a 65-year old female patient the same day.

"The woman had severe knee osteoarthrittis on both legs. Surgery was on November 8 and lasted about five hours," he said. "By God's grace, the surgeries were successful and

the patient has since been discharged."

He added that though she is walking with support now her legs were now straight

The Ogun state command of Nigeria Security and Civil Defence Corpled by the head of training, DC Ajayi Amos, has paid Babcock University a courtesy visit to follow up on the proposal to train some management staff on personal safety in view of prevailing insecurity in the country.

He said due to the insecurity couple with kidnapping, car snatching, cultism in the country there was need for personal security information that should at the fingertips of personnel in time of emergency.

According to him the insecurity situation seems to come to stay and therefore individuals and corporate organisations have to take necessary steps protect their environment against unprovoked attacks.

Responding, President/Vice Chancellor, Professor Ademola Tayo thanked the delegation for the concerns of the Corps over the lives and security of the university community.

According to him, security always took prime place on campus because where there is no security peace would be elusive.

He said the administration would continue to take proactive steps to safeguard the staff and students at all times.

He urged the Chief Security Officer of the university to liaise with the command and fine tune the modalities and report back to him.

"We are friends of the security agencies and all the time we have major events on campus we always invite them to give a helping to our in-house security," he said.

BU BUILDS NEW COLLABORATION WITH LANCASTER UNIVERSITY

head of future partnerships, Babcock and Lancaster University have agreed to joint collaborations on Waste Management, Agriculture and Health.

This came up at the November 18 stakeholders' meeting in Babcock with officials of both Universities in attendance.

The meeting also resolved a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) on student and faculty exchange, joint application research grants and students' supervision.

Lancaster University representative, Professor Kirk Sample accompanied by its Africa Strategy Adviser, Dr. Akanimo Odon, said their visit was to explore the possibility of creating mutually beneficial development partnerships.

He hoped the partnerships with Babcock and other institutions would prepare all stakeholders for the next available multidollar funding opportunity. "My visit to Babcock is to discuss this idea, engage opinions, and seek advice for equitable partnerships," he said.

In response, President/Vice Chancellor, Professor Ademola Tayo, represented by Senior Vice President Academics, Prof. Philemon Amanze, expressed optimism on the partnership. For BU Director of Research, Innovation and International Cooperation, Prof. Grace Tayo, the collaboration on Waste Management, Agriculture and Health were not only timely and apt, but beneficial to Babcock and Nigeria at large.

HR TRAINING FOCUSES ON LIFE AFTER ACTIVE SERVICE

human resources expert, Mr. Akin Akinpelu has urged staff and faculty of Babcock University to start planning for life after Babcock University.

This, according to him, was necessary because everything that has a beginning also has an end.

Mr. Akinpelu stated this while delivering a paper, Preparations for life after active service in Babcock University at the opening of a four-day training programme organized by the human resources department.

He said the end of work in Babcock would be sweet or bitter, it would, however, depends on the plan they were able to make while still on the job.

According to him, it would be better to have a well laid down retirement plans on the first day of work by thinking investments, cooperative contributive contributions, real estate, insurance, shares, among others.

He said workers could also look for other investment sources, which would provide good value growth over the years and financial cushion at the time of retirement.

He emphasized the need for workers to also

begin with fact gathering and looking at their sources of present and future income by establishing financial security and independence through early financial planning.

Mr. Akinpelu said hence retirement comes certain challenges such as boredom, feeling purposeless and loss of friends it were better they prepare well ahead to make the retirement pleasurable.

He reminded workers to delight themselves in the Lord and to trust him so as to enjoy their retirement.

According to him, not allowing God to guide and lead them could make their retirement years unenjoyable.

Another way retirement could be enjoyable, according to him, is through building of social networks and developing healthy and positive relationships with loved ones through active involvement with the community.

He noted that while retirement was supposed to give freedom, time and resources to fully enjoy life, it was sometimes not so, owing to financial difficulties, ill health and several other issues.

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BIO GAS PLANT TO BOOST WEALTH CREATION AND CLEAN AIR

abcock will soon join the league He said the bio digester will help of global institutions to replace butane with methane bio gas as cooking fuel.

This is as the University puts finishing touches on the biogas project. Already, construction work for the first phase is at advanced level.

According to the Associate Vice President for Works and Physical Planning, Prof. Ezekiel Adeniran, this project will be one of the biggest energy savers and wealth creation strategies for the University.

"We will connect pipes to drain out waste water from the over 140 sewage tanks on the main campus to the project site," he said.

The bio digester project is 95% complete. The next phase of the project will entail the collection of the waste from the student hostel and channeled to the bio digester.

to break down the waste. The effluence will be used as fertilizer while the gas will be used as cooking gas.

"The overflow we have will be further subjected to treatment and clean water which comes out will be used for irrigation purposes and the rest allowed to flow out to the canals" he added.

The food produced from the fertilizer will be used in the kitchen. The food waste from the kitchen

is put back in the bio digester thus creating a self-sustaining cycle.

Prof Adeniran believes the project holds several advantages as well as opportunities for research: from Agriculture to Botany.

"Another advantage is that we will stop polluting our ground water. It's a way of protecting our ground water." he marked.

Similarly, we will also stop evacuating waste weekly from the sewage tanks in the student hostel area.

We will save the cost which comes down to about N2million weekly from the student hostel area alone as well as create a cleaner environment.

Now that we have connected the MRI project, any waste coming from there will be channeled into the bio digester.

Ozioma ONUIRI



For the first time, the department drove the event tagged, *Let Your Light Shine* in collaboration with five other volunteer partners besides donor support.

Among these were the University's Division of Spiritual Life, Grace for Impact International NGO, the School of Nursing Sciences and medical volunteers from the Babcock University Teaching Hospital.

Dr. Ugochi Aham-Onyebuchi of Ophthalmology carried out the eye screening whilst Dr. Titus Oyedele and Mrs. Olufunmilayo Ogunbileje of the Dental department took charge of the dental check.

"Operation Smile is our way of putting smiles on the faces of children within our host community, said Programme Coordinator, Ms. Josephine Akarue. "We believe every child deserves clothing, warm meals and gifts."

Akarue who works as BU Deputy Director of Communication, said the organizing team was particularly excited because the support not only provided funding, but



turned several children's dreams to reality.

"With this support, 10 of the 18 children with vision defects will benefit from the free eye glasses. Others will get theirs with expected additional funding," she said. "Over 34 children and adults got dental check and referrals."

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DOCTORAL LAW STUDENTS HOLD TALKS ON HUMAN RIGHTS

The principle of fundamental human rights was on the top burner as a team of doctoral Law students organized a promo bono programme for Babcock High School students.

Beyond creating awareness of various aspects of human rights as enshrined in the Nigerian constitution, the programme held at the Efuntade Hall, focused on challenges of human right violations and learning to speak up.

Team lead, Barrister Leo Okafor and three other facilitators Barristers Buduka Oyagiri, Longinus Okereke and Lynda Onefeli established the importance of human rights through presentations and interactive sessions.

According to Okafor, human rights is based on biblical principles: "You must love your neighbor as yourself" and that everyone is made in the image of God.

Barrister Oyagiri on his part said no one had the right to exploit anyone

through economic or sexual pressure.

"Nobody has the right to use children as manual labor neither does anyone have the right to sexually harass or abuse them," he said.

Barrister Lynda Onefeli took the topic from the angle of the rights of women and children.

She also cited some critical and unfair facts women face in society by virtue of their gender.

"Men and women are supposed to be equal but women's rights are often infringed upon," she said. According to her, the fact that 61% of illiterates in the world are women, is a pointer to this imbalance.

She concluded her submission with a listing of major women rights violation especially in the denial of rights to education and financial freedom.

In response, the students and BUHS administration, expressed their gratitude for the programme.
