The University's pioneer doctoral Law students last Thursday organized a legal outreach programme for vulnerable community members tagged, *Know your Rights.* 

The programme, which was the first of its kind, targeted traders

& Security Studies, Prof. Deji Olanrewaju was also present with Dr. Odunaike and some other officers.

The programme addressed domestic violence, tenancy matters and human rights-related issues.

In their paper on Domestic Violence, Olawunmi Ogundipe, Sophia Abiri-Franklin and Douglas Tayo, identified stress, low self-esteem and pressure as some of the causative factors.

Similarly, Barrister Segun Abogunrin's paper on tenancy matters which he co-authored with Oleghe Ohiwere and Adesoji Adebayo, identified common causes to tenant-landlord conflicts and proffered strategies to conflict resolutions

Barrister Olayinka Razaq, Sheriff Olayinka and Adebiyi Adepoju pegged theirs on human rights.

Prof. Olanrewaju, commended the students' efforts and charged them to create a broader platform for greater impact in the future.

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### 24 SOULS BAPTIZED AS BABCOCK MARKS BATCH B WEEK OF PRAYER

wenty-four persons were baptized as the University wrapped up the Batch B Week of Prayer, April 10 - 17, the second virtual programme in 21 years.

Themed, *I Will Go*, the messages set the spiritual tone for the Babcock community to join the Seventh-day Adventist Church global call for evangelistic outreach.

"We live in uncertain times with an uncertain future," said speaker, Director of Chaplaincy & Campus Ministries for the South Ghana Conference, Pastor Nana-Koffi Nimako, "But God's word promises a secured future and end."

He reminds the congregation that since the future is in God's hands, there is absolutely no reason to be anxious.

"The future is not in the hands of scientists or political leaders," he stated. "The future is in the hands of God."

Making reference to King Nebuchadnezzar's

dream in the Book of Daniel, he said God was still in charge of times and seasons.



# LOCKBOOK EMERGES WINNER IN BUCC AWARDS

new concept in publishing technology pioneered by two Babcock Computer Science students, Enoch Oyerinde a graduate student and Israel Kehinde, a 400-level student has clinched the most Innovative Award. This was at the first virtual award ceremony of Babcock University Computer Club (BUCC]) recently.

LockBook.org is helping to accelerate the advent of sustainable electronic publishing and distribution since it began operations in 2020.

This is through the provision of a revenue-protection model for effective document distribution that guarantees increased return on livestment for Intellectual properties to authors.

Similarly, it is targeted at ensuring a wider market opportunity for everyone to make more val-

ue from their work as well as continually raise the bar of the academics, publishing and businesses across the continent.

Already, the Director of the Babcock University Press, Associate Professor Samuel Okere has expressed readiness to partner this Nigerian indigenous technology startup, LockBook.

Dr. Okere said "This award is an acknowledgment of LockBook's innovative effort in providing indigenous solution to electronic information and book distribution and management in Nigeria.

Aside the LockBook Award, there were 17 other recipients of awards including the Best Lecturer Award for the School of Computing & Engineering Sciences which went to Dr. Seun Ebiesuwa

The awards also included recognition for the Best Entrepreneur of the Year, won by Oreoluwa Omotosho, the Best start-Up, won by Olugbenga Oshodi, as well as the Best Overall 400 Level Student, Olayeni Anifowoshe and other categories.
