CULTURE AS CREATIVITY AND LAW: INDULGING IN THE PAST FOR THE FUTURE OF COPYRIGHT INDUSTRIES IN NIGERIA.

The 38th Inaugural lecture was held on the 6th of October, 2022 by Professor Ayoyemi Lawal-Arowolo. Find below a summary of the presentation.

Culture as a way of life and survival mechanism is crucial to the creative industry in Nigeria. It has been proven severally that creativity began in Africa regardless of the mode of transmission which is not intellectual property law compliant. Customs in various communities served as law even though often disregarded. Misconstrued is the perception that creativity in Africa is totally communal without recognizing the existence of individualism in communalism. Creativity always starts with one person but it is shared by many. The injustice of one cap fits all of the intellectual property law has become apparent over the years. It is time cultural innovations are accommodated in protection mechanisms across aspects of intellectual property law, at all levels from the bottom to the top. What is good for the goose is good for the gander.

Culture, cultural expressions, or expressions of folklore should be thoroughly explored in Nigeria for the future of copyright industries. The negative perceptions that cultural ways or expressions are inferior to western cultures or expressions should be discouraged. Traditional communities must be empowered in Nigeria, particularly in the context of creativity and access to protection mechanisms.

cultural Creators of expressions expressions of folklore should have legitimate authority over their creations whether as a community or an individual. This authority should be extended to creations from the past as well, called artifacts or cultural properties. The fact that protection is automatic copyright presupposes creators of cultural expressions often have rights as long as it is fixed and original. Situations, where there is no fixation, cultural practices, or norms regarding protection, should be considered. Nigeria is already legally pluralistic and little or no challenge is envisaged. A bottom-up approach enables this arrangement. The major recommendation is to indulge in the past to understand the needs of the people in the creative environment while catering to the present and preparing for the future. The consequence of this action is ensuring Nigeria has a vibrant creative industry that is reflective of its rich culture and protects all concerned in different sectors of the creative industry.






COLLABORATION CALL FROM THE UNIVERSITY OF GLASGOW, UK.

In an attempt to explore possible ways of collaboration, representatives from the University of Glasgow visited RIIC office on the 11th of October, 2022. Given the keen interest in research partnership with Babcock university, the possible areas of collaboration discussed include teaching exchange, rebate for students, summer school research methodology training and data analysis for both students and staff. Furthermore, emphasis was laid on the necessity of proffering solutions to local problems through research especially by students. who travel abroad to study.

Prof. Hansel FLETCHER - Assistant dean, Graduate Student Affairs Loma Linda University, California USA. Research

Prof Fletcher visited Babcock University from July 27 to August 3. The purpose of his visit was to initiate collaboration in antimicrobial resistance surveillance. He visited Babcock University Teaching Hospital and inspected the laboratories for initial assessment towards making SON certification.





Prof. Kelechi KALU - Founding Vice-Provost of International Affairs University of California, Riverside

Prof Kalu visited Babcock University from May 4 to 6, 2022. The purpose of his visit was to establish collaboration between University of California, Riverside and Babcock University. He visited the school of Law and Security Services where a crime and security research centre was proposed. He also presented a guest lecture titled "Public policy and national development in Nigeria" to the Veronica Adeleke School of Social Sciences. After the presentation, he had a chat with the faculty members of Department of Political Science. In June, Babcock University signed an MOU with University of California, Riverside.



He also visited the School of Science and Technology where he had a robust meeting with the Dean and some Faculty. He inspected the central analytical laboratory and promised to initiate a process for delivery of some equipment to boost the research capacity of the school. When he visited the Law School at Iperu campus, he suggested that the Babcock University should initiate the connection of all Adventist Lawyers worldwide.
